Seventh annual Stock the Lockers campaign to help local students in need 2016 campaign aims to raise \$50,000

Nanaimo, 28 July 2016 -- A new school year is just around the corner, and it is a real challenge for many local families especially those with more than one child in their household, says Crystal Dennison, executive director of Nanaimo-Ladysmith Schools Foundation (NLSF). "School supplies, clothing, shoes, school fees are expensive," she adds.

NLSF is holding its seventh 'Stock the Lockers' campaign and aims to raise \$50,000 to help local students whose families can't afford the extra expense of school-related costs. The three-week campaign kicks off at Staples' North Nanaimo store, 6581 Aulds Road, on Thursday, August 11 at 10 am.

"Starting the school year off with the right supplies helps ensure that all students are able to come to school ready to learn," says Dennison.

Poverty is very real among many students in the Nanaimo-Ladysmith School District that historically has a high child poverty rate.

According to Dr. Paul Hasselback, Island Health's medical health officer for the central Island region, of the more than 13,000 students expected in schools this year, almost 3,000 will come to school with less than sufficient resources. That means for some students arriving at school without breakfast or without the needed school supplies. For others, this might mean not participating in school sports teams or other extracurricular activities, or not sharing in school outings.

"Despite issues of poverty, many students are successful in their academic achievements," says Dennison. "Giving them a helping hand in the form of school supplies, adequate foot ware for PE, clean clothes, breakfast, lunch, and other unmet basic needs allows them to focus on their education and helps support them on the road to making a better future for themselves."

"Generous donors are making a difference in the lives of local students and helping them to get an education, which is so important in today's society" she adds.

The needs are great, and Dennison works closely with principals, teachers and school staff who know which children require help.

Donations for the Stock the Lockers campaign are taken at the two Staples stores in Nanaimo, Coastal Community Credit Union branches, Ladysmith Credit Union and the two Country Grocer stores. Contributions can also be made on-line through the foundation's website: www.NLSF.ca.

Tax receipts will be issued by mail for donations over \$20.
